# RELIGION OR RELATIONSHIP?

would you describe Christianity? Most of us would probably describe it as a religion – a system of beliefs, with associated rules and rituals. The problem is that an increasing number of people seem to find the whole idea of 'religion' a bit dull and uninspiring.

To do something 'religiously' means to do it in a repetitive and dutiful manner, without much joy or excitement. Karl Marx called religion "the opium of the people" because he thought that it kept them sedated. When you add in to the mix some of the awful things done in the name of religion, it is little wonder that few people are inspired by it.

However, when we read the Bible, we find that the Christian faith is not a religion but a relationship. To be a Christian is to have a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. This relationship will be expressed through some 'religious' activities, such as going to church, but the heart of the matter is not rules or rituals; it is a personal trust in Jesus Christ and a personal devotion to Jesus Christ.

That is why the Apostle Paul describes his chief goal in life as being "to know Christ" (Philippians 3v10). He even says that he considers the outward trappings of religion to be utter rubbish compared to the surpassing greatness of knowing Jesus. Paul was convinced that only Jesus Christ could bring him forgiveness of sins, peace with God and eternal security, and so his overriding ambition was always to know Christ.

Religion will do us no good at all, if we do not have a living relationship with the Lord Jesus.

## **ANN'S NATURE NOTES**

am afraid that February is my least favourite month, a month of wet, damp mists, and cold and mud; mud everywhere outside and inside the house. It is traditionally called February fill-dyke. In Anglo-Saxon times it was called sol, - mud month! There are many traditional sayings like when a cat lies in the sun in February she will creep behind the stove in March. I shall be watching Jennyanydots! If February doeth give much snow, a fine summer it will bestow. The farmers at this time of the year used to be busy hedging and ditching, ready for the spring, and it is traditionally the time for lambing and is the start of the early flowers peeping out, like February Gold, an early Daffodil. Crocuses should be out by now, giving lovely colour under trees. Last year we saw a wonderful display in the churchyard at Tewkesbury Abbey under a large tree.

The birds have begun to sing, marking their territory. The Mistle Thrush was first off, but in the mornings the air is gradually getting fuller with song, and it is definitely getting lighter, so spring is approaching. The Rooks by now have started to build their nests, and what a noise they make while doing it. The nearest Rookery is in Cove.

This is the time to go and watch the famous Starling roosts at Ham Wall. You need to get to Ashcott Corner on a FINE late afternoon; dress up warmly, and wait. After a while, when dusk approaches you can watch wave after wave of Starlings overhead as they settle for the evening. It is a really fabulous sight.

then somebody very now and experiences such profound а psychological or emotional blow that their life comes to a full stop and they can't seem to get going again. It can be through illness or accident, the loss of a job or a relationship, or perhaps just years of carrying a burden they can't manage any longer. There will be people struggling to cope in your area as you read this.

The Voluntary Support Scheme operates in Mid Devon. It helps people work out what they need to do to make their lives better, and then helps them to do it. We link experienced, well-trained volunteers to visit people, typically, for an hour a week in their homes. We try to find the best fit of volunteer for each person. The relationship people have with their volunteers can be the most important thing in their lives.

We take referrals from many sources, such as, GP Surgeries, Devon NHS Mental Health Team, voluntary organisations, concerned family members and self-referrals. We can react quickly to referrals, normally within a fortnight. We do not charge for any of our services but do need to raise funds to pay the sala-





## **LEGITIMATE PRIVACY**

When Oxford City Council announced last week that all taxis and cabs in the city must have CCTV cameras recording both sight and sound on all journeys, there was an outcry from organisations such as Big Brother



Watch. Peter Allen, the Drive programme presenter on BBC 5 Live, joked: "Of course, some people believe that's already happening, with a big camera in the sky - those of a religious disposition." Meanwhile in the States a case currently before the Supreme Court could open the way to the police tracking the movements of mobile phone users without a warrant. The government lawyers' argument is that the defendant, whose car was bugged with a GPS tracking device, does not have "a legitimate expectation of privacy". In this case the American Civil Liberties Union is sounding warning bells.

As Spooks' fans will be aware, software for tracking mobile phones already exists and is highly sophisticated. As tabloid haters will be all too aware, the software for hacking into phones and computers is advanced and often, it seems, employed. The Leveson Inquiry is beginning its quest to uncover the extent of the abuse. The tipping-point of the News of the World scandal came with the revelation that murdered teenager Milly Dowler's phone had been hacked. That seemed to be in a different category from 'celebrities' and politicians who themselves court the media for publicity. The Dowlers and the Mc-Canns, appearing before Lord Leveson, came across as ordinary folk whose private grief was gratuitously invaded and trampled on by journalists who had abandoned human decency and lost the gift of empathy in pursuit of 'the story'.

What is a legitimate expectation of privacy? How private should our lives be? In Scripture it is true that nothing is hidden from God, as the old prayer has it, "Almighty God, to whom all hearts are open and from whom no secrets are hid". In that sense, Peter Allen is right. As Jesus warns: "Nothing is hidden except to be made manifest" (Mark 4.22). But this is far from being a snooping God. If I may put it that way, He has better things to do with time. He is into redeeming it. His ultimate judgement is to raise our sights now. He's the Jesus who knew all people and what was in humankind (John 2:24-5).

The fact of God's omniscience does not give us the right to know everything



about each other. That's His prerogative. It's not something we could handle. In fact our overriding duty to each other is that of love, and in the Christian community "love covers a multitude of sins" which seems to mean that where love abounds, offences are frequently overlooked and quickly forgotten (ESV Study Bible). Frequently, but not always. Sadly the Church has too often employed cover-ups rather than being transparent and repentant - which fools no-one and undermines its prophetic integrity. Often it's secular media which have blown the Church's cover.

Privacy deserves protection. Intrusion into private life and conversations can rarely be justified. Yet a responsible free press is a blessing, without doubt. Perhaps it should be guided by this motto: "Love does not rejoice at wrongdoing, but rejoices with the truth."

## **CHARITABLE** COMPASSION (by Carole Pilley)

ow can small charities hold on to the values that have shaped us in the face of powerful external forces that currently challenge us and what are these forces?

The starting place has to be the recession and the consequences are well evidenced in terms of increasing needs and less money available to meet them. That inevitably has led charities to review the way they work and how they can fund their work. This has been followed by massive funding cuts and political changes that are re-shaping and reducing the role of the state whilst increasing the power of the market and this has led many charities to compete and vie for their place within an albeit financially constrained market.

The increased use of 'commissioning' and the move away from grant funding to procure services means that local organisations can be forced out of the market because they cannot compete with national or international The commissioning organisations. body decides what is to be delivered and thus retains control over what they consider to be a need.

The size of some contracts being offered means that for small charities they may be unable to compete. The Independent reported that 'LSSI, an American firm which manages 13 public libraries across the US, has set itself a target to manage libraries in eight British local authorities by the end of the year and to capture 15 per cent of the market within five years...Private firms Serco, Sodexo and Mitie have been chosen as preferred bidders to run the Community Payback scheme for offenders, currently run by probation staff, with no voluntary groups making the shortlist, and there are many more examples.

Charity was born out of a passion to help and benefit others - a sense of 'kindness and tolerance in our treatment of others' and 'compassion', always to treat all others as we wish to be treated ourselves."

The Charter for Compassion states that, "Compassion impels us to work tirelessly to alleviate the suffering of our fellow creatures, to dethrone ourselves from the centre of our world and put another there, and to honour the inviolable sanctity of every single human being, treating everybody, without exception, with absolute justice, equity and respect."

Our values help us to keep sight of the kind of world that we want to be part of and if we are truly committed to creating a socially just world then we need to not only hold on to our values but to actively cultivate them and act upon them.
