TRICK OR TREAT ~ HARMLESS OR DANGEROUS ?

■ alloween is thought to have originated with the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain, in the belief that on the night before their New Year on 1 November. the boundary between the worlds of the living and the dead become blurred. On the night of 31 October they believed that the ghosts of the dead returned to earth; people would liaht bonfires and wear costumes to ward off roaming ghosts.

In the eighth century, the Church designated 1 November as a time to honour all saints and martyrs: ΔII Saints' Eve, Halloween, evolved into а secular, community based event. Apparently one quarter of all the sweets sold annually in America are purchased for Halloween!

For many, Halloween today is harmless fun characterized by child-friendly activities such as dressing up in ghoulish costumes and trick-or-treating. For others it can become a passage towards witchcraft and involvement with dark occult forces.

Sometimes I am asked what my attitude to this festival is, do I agree it is just a bit of fun or is it dangerously playing with forces we do not understand?



Put like that it is not an easy one to answer in a "yes" or "no" manner. For many children the evening is indeed a harmless exercise in dressing up and having fun. However, I have to say that I find some of the activities associated and marketing somewhat sinister. "Trick or Treat" has within the very title the idea of blackmail. There is something quite Sub-Christian in the idea that "I will do something unpleasant to you unless you do something I want"

At worst this is the philosophy of the protection racket employed by gangsters and terrorists, leading to extortion of large sums of money to keep the victim safe or even to avoid murder.

Now this might be considered an over-reaction to a few kids asking for a sweet "or else I will put this spider through your letter box." Maybe it is - but the philosophy behind it is the same and I do not want my grandchildren to adopt such a concept.

Put alongside the Christian Gospel the Halloween message is shown up for what it is. The Lord Jesus offers us forgiveness and new life freely and without cost. Far from asking us for a favour as a condition of blessing us, His offer is freely made; we accept by faith. He took the trick for us on the cross - we are left with the treat!

he following article has been taken from a recent Bible Society Leaflet. John Roberts found it profoundly moving and thought it worth including in "TODAY".

A CONVICTED MURDERER TRANSFORMED BY **SCRIPTURE**

I'm about to tell you about an amazing change in someone's life. It's an incredible story of what can happen when someone is offered the Bible. I think you'll want to hear it because it shows the powerful impact of this mission we share and I hope it will spur you to keep giving and praying, because your support makes such a difference.

This is his testimony.

Dawit was a murderer, a rapist and a thief. He was feared and hated around his town, in rural Ethiopia. His family disowned him. He terrorised women: raped them, robbed them and killed them and he ran away to live wild in the forest for months at a time. When Dawit was finally captured, he received a double life sentence and was imprisoned.

"I deserved to be in that horrible cell" he said. "There was no hope for me." But God had other ideas.

Dawit continues: "One day during recess hour, a black box appeared in the communal room. I used to sit in the corner of the room far from anyone, but I couldn't ignore the sound coming from the box. It was a Proclaimer Audio Bible, provided by the Bible Society and the voice that day was speaking about a God that died for our sins. I listened closely. I could hear three voices. One was Jesus and the other two were sinners. All were being crucified.

'One sinner said they were being killed for a reason, but Jesus didn't do anything to deserve his fate. It got me thinking. As I listened more, it talked about God's unfailing love for all of humanity. That night, I couldn't sleep. The message stuck with me. Even though I was rejected by society. Jesus Christ accepted me and loved me no matter what.

'The next day, I heard some more. Over that week, I discovered Jesus as my personal Lord and Saviour. He has taken me in his arms and loved me like his son, no matter how bad the crimes I have committed. He has freed me from the chains of evil and given me another chance."

That was 10 years ago. Dawit, now 46, is still in Akaki Prison, Addis Ababa, but today he has the role of Prison Pastor and co-ordinates the daily Bible Listening Group. The wardens trust and respect him. He has 25 years left to serve in jail - but says, "God put me here for a reason. I am helping so many other men to change their ways and discover God. I am happy to still be in this prison because it's my mission to share God's love with everyone".

It's inspiring, isn't it? The words of Scripture reaching into the darkest places, to bring about transformation. In 2015, we'd love to provide 1,000 more Proclaimers to prisons, hospitals, orphanages and rural communities in Ethiopia. It will see an additional 50,000 people, like Dawit, join listening groups where they'll hear a section of the New Testament, in their language, every week, and discuss it. We also want to support Bible listening countries like Cambodia and Tanzania.

But to do all this, we need your help. It costs £40 to provide a Proclaimer audio Bible - that's £40 to open up Scripture, week after week, to a listening group of up to 50 people.

The Bible is more than a book. Dawit's story is testimony to the power of Scripture. Do pray for him and his ministry in Akaki Prison. And, please,



The horse chestnut trees seem to have re-assumed their glorious form of old in recent years, so perhaps the threat from the leaf miner insect is receding. At present I have yet to see the unparalleled shiny chestnut colour that springs from the split in the thorny green coat of the fallen fruit. I have a reminder though, with a row of dull old conkers by our fireplace. This display is to ward off the Autumn appearance of the poor indoor spider, probably large and male, as it has one last fling. The conkers will have no effect*, as these spiders have been adapting to our houses for centuries, resigned to having few guests in their parlours, despite being in the quiet corners that unwary visitors like to discover. These home-lovers do not feel the cold [they are of course cold blooded] but will have little desire to visit the alien outside habitat of their country cousins and the feeling for exchange visits is mutual.

I leave the wizened conkers in our fireplace to comfort the 'arachnophobes' in the family and unusually I have some sympathy, as I was bitten this year by Britain's most venomous spider, the false widow. I destroyed its lair whilst cleaning the windows and the swelling and pain lasted 24 hours. I suggest you do not mention either the bite, or my view of deterrents, to the family and assure them that at least one of the conkers will be a potential 49er by now!

*Interestingly, I note the oil from the horse chestnut is listed as a constituent of some clothes moth deterrents.

David expected much from his school pupils. He used to take some of them on trips to the Lake District, hoping they would find it as inspiring as he did. We are told that one group had the unforgettable experience of standing on the summit of Great Gable and singing the rousing Welsh hymn 'Guide me, O thou great Redeemer'. We sang this hymn at David's funeral. We send our love to Betty and all the family.

The past two months have been a difficult time for Audrey and Bryan Rigg, who have been struggling to combat a particular nasty virus. We wish them well and hope they will soon be back as busy as ever.

Meanwhile, the Family Dog Show was a very popular and successful event, on a sunny afternoon, and raised £956 split between the church and the parish hall. 


